City agrees to aid school busing gap

Funding plan includes district, private help

Public school students will be guaranteed a bus ride option to their school under a two-year agreement that would provide \$30,000 annually in city funding to be equally matched by the Oshkosh Area School District and private support.

The Common Council at its Feb. 11

meeting unanimously approved the city's expected contribution toward a solution to what has been a years-long discussion on how to provide low-income and otherwise disadvantaged families a reliable option to promote steady attendance.

The council agreed in principle to work with the school district on the program, details of which are still in discussion before final approval by the council and school board. Council members discussed program terms that ranged from one to three years before the resolution settled on a July 1 start date that will run through

June 30, 2022, before any adjustments are made based on data and funding review.

Students who live within two miles of their school are generally not eligible for district busing and may need to walk to and from their school if their families are not able to provide consistent transportation or able to afford a daily city bus. One-way fares on GO Transit buses are \$1.50, or \$35 for a monthly pass.

The council heard from more than 10

Freezing for a reason

Sex offender housing draws neighboring concern

Less than a mile from Merrill middle and elementary schools there is an apartment home in a downtown neighborhood that currently houses seven registered sex offenders.

According to records from the Wisconsin Department of Corrections (WDOC) sex offender registry and Oshkosh Police Department all residents of the house

have convictions of sexual misconduct against or possession of illegal material of people under 18, some with a warning of potential to repeat.

The house and its residents have raised concerns among community members since October 2010 when it was designated as a temporary housing service for newly released convicted individuals.

Larry Luther, 23 E. New York Ave., spoke to the Common Council Feb. 11 about those neighbors and said his prima-

ry concern was for the safety of his grandchildren. His voice echoed those of 29 neighbors within three blocks who have signed in to be part of an ongoing Facebook chat room that informs each other of new developments and ways to advocate for change.

He contends the residents at 1105 Jefferson are not being monitored appropriately, having "extracurricular sexual activity and allegedly selling, handing off drugs." Council member Debra Allison-Aasby,

who invited Luther to the meeting, asked if the activities increase between spring and fall seasons, and Luther said they did.

Mayor Lori Palmeri asked Luther what he would suggest the council do. She made it clear this can't be a "not in my backyard" situation because convicted people who have served their time will always need a place to go. Right now there are four peo-

UW Oshkosh grad student tuition to rise 2%

Tuition for graduate students at the University of Wisconsin Oshkosh will increase by 2 percent in the 2020-2021 academic year after the UW System Board of Regents unanimously approved tuition increases Feb. 7 at six universities.

UW-Milwaukee, UW-Platteville and UW-Whitewater will see undergraduate tuition increases. Those schools, along with UW Oshkosh, UW-River Falls and UW-Stevens Point, will see increases for graduate and other degree-specific programs, according to a UW System Business and Finance Committee document.

The undergraduate increases will only affect students from out of state because of the UW System's tuition freeze, while the graduate and degree-specific increases will impact all students.

The tuition proposals came from the six universities after they "considered the impacts of the proposed tuition increases

on student demand and enrollment," the document states.

Regent Jan Mueller told Wisconsin Public Radio that the increases aim to bring tuition more in line with program costs.

Tuition at UWO will increase by 2 percent for resident and nonresident graduate and Business Master's Program students in the 2020-2021 academic year. The 2 percent increase is below the average increase in the cost of instruction, the document states.

UWO's estimated revenue from the increases is \$109,747, which the document said will be used to cover the costs of instruction in an "increasingly competitive market."

For graduate students from Wisconsin, tuition will increase by \$155 and raise the total to \$7,949, while out-of-state graduate students' tuition will increase by \$342 for a total of \$17,448, according to the document. Tuition will increase for residential business master's program stu-

dents by \$167, taking the total to \$8,525, while tuition for nonresident students will increase by \$353, to reach \$18,052.

UWO director of graduate services Greg Wypiszynski said the numbers in the document appear inflated because they are based on a 15-credit class load while most graduate students take classes part time — six or fewer credits per semester.

For example, he said one resident graduate credit for spring 2020 is \$501, so the increase per credit is \$10. For out-of-state students, he said one spring credit is \$1,018, so the increase per credit is \$20.

"A small 2 percent increase still allows UW Oshkosh a lot of flexibility to be a very affordable option when it comes to graduate studies," Wypiszynski said.

The increase was necessary, he said, because UWO was about 2-10 percent below other UW institutions in general graduate tuition and about 2-4 percent below peer business graduate tuition rates in the 2018-2019 academic year.

"Graduate tuition at UW Oshkosh has remained frozen along with undergraduate tuition, even though the legislative freeze of undergraduate tuition never included graduate tuition," he said. "Not seeking to raise graduate tuition all this time was an effort to hold the line on any increases for as long as possible."

Wypiszynski doesn't expect enrollment to be affected because graduate tuition at UWO is competitively priced compared to other UW graduate schools and private graduate schools.

"I don't expect there'll be any appreciable effect on enrollment regardless of the program," he said. "It's unlikely a 2 percent increase will cause an immediate or significant drop in enrollment."

Battle on Bago mixes fun and fundraising

From its small-scale beginnings as a local ice fishing fundraiser to becoming the largest tournament of its kind in the nation, Battle on Bago enters its 13th year this weekend with a continued focus on youth and conservation.

Spanning four Fox Valley lakes –Winnebago, Winneconne, Poygan and Butte des Morts — the tournament based off Millers Bay in Menominee Park has been adjusting over the years to everything from expansion to the weather.

“We’ve seen pretty steady growth over the years,” said Noah Hinrichs, who serves on the Battle on Bago board of directors. “I believe the first year the tournament was held there were about 250 participants; last year by our estimates we had 10,000 total participants and spectators over the course of the weekend.”

With that growth came the need to move tourney headquarters from the ice to land at the park and find the biggest heated tent available, which hosts food, beverages, live music and raffle prizes for participants and spectators along with the all-important fish registration. This year’s kickoff party features The Presidents rock band from 6 to 11 p.m. Thursday.

The winter tournament was started by some of the current board members to raise money for the Oshkosh Rotary. Prize packages have grown along with

new sponsors to surpass \$275,000 worth of cash and items that don’t all require catching the biggest fish.

The 10-person board meets throughout the year to decide where and how funds are distributed. Organizations can request support for their causes that need to focus on the stated mission of “Kids and Conservation.”

“Since 2007, Battle on Bago has raised more than \$1.3 million that has gone back to our community to help kids enjoy what makes Wisconsin so great,” Hinrichs said.

Ice conditions have dictated the scope of the tournament, once forcing a cancellation of the fishing but never the tent party. Fishing is unlikely to be affected this year with recent colder conditions to thicken the ice.

“We monitor weather very closely with the local fishing clubs and resident ice experts. Safety is always our first concern for our anglers,” Hinrichs said.

Two years ago, the board instituted a slot limit on the size of walleye that can be registered for prize consideration, thus encouraging anglers to release fish too small to qualify. “This was instituted to maintain the integrity of the resource we are using,” he said.

Tickets to compete are on sale until 6 a.m. Friday at Fleet Farm locations and Fox Valley retailers, along with limited-edition membership packages. More information is at BattleonBago.org.

School consolidation options, images aired

As no one from the public showed up to address the Board of Education on agenda or non-agenda items, the board had an hour and a half to hear consolidation recommendations from the district's Facilities Advisory Board.

Headed by Deputy Superintendent David Gundlach, the advisory group furthered its plans for "Option B" consolidation from 20 to 14 school facilities.

The panel presented PowerPoint slides of existing "modern" facilities throughout the state. Members of the board said it was amazing that the facilities they saw were existing facilities and not artistic renderings.

"These environments are better for learning," Board of Education Vice President Kelly Olmsted said of the facilities shown. Superintendent Vicki Cartwright added that their use of open spaces and natural light can help students struggling with mental health.

In addition to the open designs, the modern facilities emphasized lab spaces with robotics, STEM and STEAM fields. Cartwright said that is important here,

where she hears from some employers that some Oshkosh students are not ready out of high school to join a technology workforce. She said these improvements could help.

Gundlach said updated schools and systems will also attract new residents to the area. He said prospective residents will take a walk through the schools and be impressed, and want to stay.

The presentation with its images can be seen on Oshkosh Media's YouTube page. Board members encouraged the public to see what the potential could be.

The advisory group then went into discussion of the phases, of which there would be four under Option B. The first phase would close Merrill Middle School and consolidate students from Merrill Elementary and Middle school, Webster Stanley Elementary and Middle school, and Washington Elementary into their respective grades.

Gundlach said surveys and feedback indicate the public generally understands this first phase.

Phase two would call for more consolidation, renovation and replacement, but to west-side schools. Phases three and four would renovate or replace West and North high schools in that order.

Gundlach said it will likely take more referendums to see the entire plan through and asked district residents to imagine the day when all of these plans are accomplished.

Neighborhood progress detailed

Oshkosh's healthy neighborhood movement made tremendous strides in 2019 to upgrade the quality of community revitalization in the city, according to the executive director of Greater Oshkosh Healthy Neighborhoods.

Pam Ruder summarized the work of the group to the Common Council at its Feb. 11 meeting, noting that the organization has rebranded itself as Oshkosh Healthy Neighborhoods as it works with residents to create new recognized associations throughout the city. Three new entities were formed in 2019: the Fox Chase, Menominee North and Midtown neighborhood associations.

Ruder said her organization supported 90 community building events and tracked 4,201 volunteer hours put in by residents from the current 18 neighborhood associations.

Among the highlights of that work in-

cluded a Neighborhood Night at the Leach Amphitheater, a National Neighborhood Night Out on Aug. 16 and a National Good Neighbor Day on Sept. 28. The organization was also actively involved in the Rock the Block program in the Sacred Heart Neighborhood Association, completing projects at 23 properties and renovation of Stoegebauer Park. Other collaborators on Rock the Block were Habitat for Humanity in Oshkosh and the city's Community Development Department.

Oshkosh Healthy Neighborhoods will undertake the next Rock the Block program in the Congress Fields neighborhood later this year, and a new trailer was acquired to be used at block parties and other neighborhood events.

Total community building and engagement investment last year, according to Ruder, was valued at \$137,949.

"Social connections are very important" in getting neighbors to work with other neighbors to promote the quality of life in their neighborhoods, Ruder said.

Art Nouveau master's exhibition on display

Alphonse Mucha: Master of Art Nouveau, an acclaimed exhibition examining the artist's broad range of work at the turn of the 20th century, has opened at the Paine Art Center and Gardens.

Mucha's work became synonymous with the international Art Nouveau style, which took inspiration from the natural world. Its sinuous lines and whiplash

curves influenced art, architecture and design.

Historic photos reimaged by photographers

The Oshkosh Public Museum's new exhibition "Then & Now, Old Photos as Today" features selected photographs from the museum's archive that four local photographers have reimaged and modernized to fit today's perception.

The photographers — Tara Pichelmeyer, One.Two.Three Photography; Phil Weston, Weston Imaging; Don Stolley, Stolley Studio; and Nick Dvoracek, Pinholica — were able to drastically change the outcome of an image through camer-

as, lenses and the timing of a photo.

The exhibition offers the original locations and passage of time in the same photos in comparison; posing people in a similar manner or situation; an occupation as it looks currently; and a situation or setting reimaged to the 21st century.

The exhibit will open with a reception from 1:30 to 3:30 p.m. Sunday with the photographers and an opportunity for visitors to take photos while children can make crafts. The cost is general admission.

A group of local residents is organizing to petition the Common Council to place an advisory referendum on the November election ballot to support a constitutional amendment to overturn the 2010 Citizens United decision by the U.S. Supreme Court that gave corporations, unions,

nonprofits and super political action committees (Super PACs) the same rights as individual citizens.

The group is holding an informational meeting at 1 p.m. Saturday at the Festival Foods community room, 2416 Westowne Ave., where George Penn from Wisconsin

United to Amend (WIUTA) will discuss the group's efforts on the national initiative.

More than 5,000 signatures are needed to present the petition to the council, according to Cheryl Hansen, a lead organizer of the group in Oshkosh that plans to begin collecting signatures on the petition during the April 7 primary election. Hansen said signers of the petition must be city residents; volunteers collecting the signatures do not.

"We're looking for concerned citizens who want to restore the balance of power to ordinary citizens rather than Super PACs and other large groups that can buy the votes of politicians through campaign contributions of millions of dollars," she said.

To date, 20 states and an estimated 800 communities, including 146 in Wisconsin, have passed resolutions calling for the constitutional amendment. WIUTA estimates that more than 5 million people have signed petitions expressing opposition to Citizens United.

Sawdust vision moves through city agencies

The Sawdust District plan for redevelopment of property along South Main Street will be acted on by the Common Council, Plan Commission and Oshkosh Redevelopment Authority at future meetings over the next month.

The city's planning staff within the Department of Community Development presented to three public groups during a joint workshop meeting Feb. 11 ahead of

the council meeting and obtained input from members of the three groups.

The plan was going before the Plan Commission on Tuesday, the council Feb. 25 and Oshkosh Redevelopment Authority on March 18.

Planning Director Mark Lyons said the city's two-year effort breaks the South Shore region into separate areas to guide redevelopment to revitalize the entire district.

The master plan seeks to direct growth, development and infrastructure invest-

ments through recommendations, strategies and policies. A special Sawdust District section on the city's website describes details of the plan.

One major goal is to develop strategies that will promote housing developments. Another goal is to create an entertainment plan that will bring people into the area while another is to create commercial opportunities.

The South Main area was historically the site of lumber and furniture industries. As that diminished some buildings were

razed and a mix of commercial interests developed there. In 2000, the city partnered with the Oshkosh Area Community Foundation and Chamber of Commerce to create a Downtown Action Plan. In 2017, the city further refined that plan to create an Imagine Oshkosh Plan to update previous planning.

The Sawdust District Plan incorporates the work of a Sawdust District Advisory Group that met monthly since 2018 along with city staff meeting with residents and property owners to gather their input.

Border funding shift will impact HEMTT, military orders

Oshkosh Defense will be among U.S. military contractors who would see a decrease in heavy vehicle orders from the federal government as additional Defense Department funding is shifted to Mexico border wall construction.

With the White House announcement last week that it plans to divert \$3.8 billion from the Defense Department's budget this year, Oshkosh's Heavy Expanded Mobile Tactical Truck (HEMTT) production for the Army will be reduced by \$101 million from its original \$194 million procurement.

The administration's Reprogramming Action Notice details the 2020 fiscal year funding shift among the military branches, stating "funds are available because they are excess to current programmatic need."

In a separate contract, Oshkosh Defense announced Monday that the U.S. Army Contracting Command has placed an order for 1,240 Joint Light Tactical Vehicles (JLTVs) and associated kits. The order includes JLTVs for the U.S. Marine Corps, Slovenia and Lithuania

In a letter to Defense Secretary Mark Esper, Wisconsin U.S. Sen. Tammy Baldwin and other Democratic senators objected

to the HEMTT funding transfer.

"We are dismayed that the Department decided to target congressional increases to a vast number of critical programs, from aircraft to ships, including the perennially-underfunded Army National Guard, Air National Guard, and other Reserve Components," the senators wrote.

Oshkosh Defense has produced more than 35,000 HEMTTs, both newly built and remanufactured, since 1982 with current variants under the A4 name. The HEMTT provides transport for supply and resupply of combat vehicles and weapons systems.

Last year's national emergency declaration will be used to pull \$3.5 billion from military counter-drug enforcement, up from the \$2.5 billion taken in 2019. Another \$3.2 billion will come from Defense construction projects for additional fencing work.

Baldwin, a member of the Senate Appropriations Defense Subcommittee, said in a press release that the funding shift also would affect work previously approved for Fairbanks Morse in Beloit on a new America-class Amphibious Navy Ship. She said the program supports more than 100 jobs in Beloit.

speakers expressing either their organization or family's support for closing the gap in school busing.

Jon Doemel, representing the Oshkosh Kids Foundation, said the group currently provides \$3,000 a month for bus passes that it wants to shift toward other assistance efforts for low-income families. Donations to his group to pay for the tokens that school social workers currently give to students who request them can be sent through oshkoshkids.org/donations/give-today.

Others spoke about the impact that transportation issues can have on students and families, while Boys & Girls Club leader Tracy Ogden noted that the funding will help her organization on one level while scheduling changes still would be needed to get children home from the club after hours.

Council members spoke in strong sup-

port of the school transportation effort ahead of their 7-0 vote while expressing some reservations on the lack of details for eligibility and the city having a primary role in this form of student busing.

Council member Debra Allison-Aasby said the need for providing such a service was clear while suggesting the school district should have taken the initiative on covering the costs as is being done in other communities such as Appleton and Green Bay. She said the program puts the city in a position where it is choosing to support one demographic group over others that it serves that are equally in need of public assistance.

"I don't believe that the city of Oshkosh should be picking and choosing which group is most deserving in poverty to get buses," Allison-Aasby said in seeking a one-year version of the program to gain more data and allow the school district to take a more active role in defining the issue.

Other members said it was time to act on a problem that has lingered for years and start to provide help toward what had

been identified as a gap in services.

"We've got to understand where certain kids and families come from compared to more privileged families that don't even consider this a problem or a conflict in their life," council member Jake Krause said.

Mayor Lori Palmeri acknowledged the council's misgivings about some of the details and the city's commitment to a school-centered issue while supporting the resolution's goal for community progress. Council members Bob Poeschl, who is also a member of the Board of Education, and Matt Mugerauer, who led the resolution effort, said they appreciated concerns expressed by their colleagues for what they said wasn't going to be a perfect plan until it could be measured while in action.

"Dissent is how things change. I feel that your opinions and your insights are extremely important to how we move forward with creating this," Poeschl said, who believes the time is right to move forward on a program than can shape future community efforts for children.

Also at the council meeting:

- City Manager Mark Rohloff reported that this year's Fourth of July fireworks would move back to Menominee Park after being held in the downtown area last year. Among the reasons was the expected development of the Pioneer Island site that had been used to launch the fireworks across from Riverside Park and Leach Amphitheater.

- Rohloff reported the city is still in recovery mode on reinstalling its computer system after a virus, reportedly having a Russian influence, knocked out the city's online and email system. He noted that Racine was similarly affected along with other communities across the country.

- The council went into a closed session to discuss legal issues. This included potential litigation on any roadwork fee plan being considered, negotiations for the purchase of land in the 700 block of South Main Street, the Pioneer Island and marina area, and the 1000 block of South Main Street, and litigation on pollutant discharge permits with the state Department of Natural Resources.

ple waiting to be released to the house, according to public notices released by police Feb. 13.

Deputy Mayor Steve Herman, a former sheriff's deputy in Winnebago County, said the city could change ordinances so that the house would not be allowed in that particular neighborhood, but emphasized that a new location not in a residential neighborhood would need services such as bus transportation readily available.

City Manager Mark Rohloff said he could add a workshop to the council's cal-

endar so city officials can continue the conversation. Public comments to the council aren't usually taken up on the council agenda. The council agreed to add this one.

Luther called the house a "revolving door" of sexually violent people, which Rohloff conceded.

"When one person leaves, they fill it with another. They pretty much keep the house full," Rohloff said.

Herman said the area has more than an average number of convicted sexual offenders released because of the nearby medium-security prison.

County Sheriff John Matz said the WDOC is the place to go with inquiries, where on its website notes it is hard to find

a spot for sexually violent people in any city.

"By design, parks, schools, and day care centers are located conveniently throughout every community in the state," the WDOC website reads. "Community safety, family support, employment and a stable residence are important factors in deciding on the most appropriate residence. A residence plan that addresses these factors can help foster positive change in the offender."

Luther said police patrol activity around the Jefferson Street neighborhood has increased recently and called that a good thing.

According to the sex offender registry, current residents of the Jefferson Street


house have been convicted of, in total, four cases of possession of child pornography, two cases of second-degree sexual assault of a child, child enticement, soliciting a child for prostitution, first-degree sexual assault of a child and exposing genitals to a child. Six of the residents were convicted in Winnebago County and one convicted in Milwaukee.

"The difficult part the city will always have is that we don't have all of the control (of where newly released people are assigned to live), but we have to start the discussion somewhere," Allison-Aasby said. The contract for the house is up for renewal in March.

Young Eagles program hits 2.2M mark

The nation's biggest youth aviation education program reached another milestone in January as the Experimental Aircraft Association's Young Eagles program surpassed 2.2 million children flown since it began at the 1992 EAA Fly-In Convention.

"As we reach each of these milestones, it's a further credit to the dedication of the EAA-member pilots and volunteers who have committed their time and aircraft to bringing young people into aviation," said Jack Pelton, EAA chief executive and chairman of the board. "The success of Young Eagles means thousands of today's under-40 pilots can trace their personal journeys back to that first flight with a Young Eagles pilot."

More than 50,000 EAA-member pilots have donated their time, aircraft and fuel to fly children over the past 27 years, with an equal number of ground volunteers assisting the program. Flights have taken place on every continent except Antarctica, and in aircraft ranging from hot air balloons to corporate jets.

Young Eagles began in 1992 in response to a survey of EAA members who overwhelmingly replied that getting young people involved in aviation was the most important issue to ensure the future of recreational flight. Last year the inaugural group of more than 100 Ray Aviation Scholarship recipients earned full flight training scholarships in conjunction with EAA chapters.

He wants to start a new family in America to replace the one he lost to the genocide. He chooses a mail-order bride, an Armenian teenager named Seta, who also has escaped the vicious grip of the Ottoman Turks. He hopes to build a marriage and a family.

The cast includes two UWO students: Ali Basham, a junior Spanish and communication studies double major from Appleton, plays Seta; and Max Benitz, a junior theater arts major from Wisconsin Rapids, plays Aram.

In what was an emotional day for the six seniors on the University of Wisconsin Oshkosh men's basketball team quickly turned to joy as the Titans continued their quest for the postseason with another home win.

Already with a spot in the WIAC post-season tournament after their win against Stevens Point on Wednesday, the Titans guaranteed themselves at least one game and no worse than a No. 4 seed as they used a second-half surge to pull away from UW-Stout, 84-60, Saturday.

First it was Quinn Steckbauer getting inside for an easy two before Will Mahoney connected on a beautiful and-one play to push the lead to 16-10. After missing the last three games with an eye injury, having Mahoney's return will be a big lift for the Titans moving forward.

Getting the ball inside continued to be the motto as Eddie Muench found Levi Borchert on the fast break for an easy bucket before senior Adam Fravert brought the house down with a thunderous two-handed slam on the baseline to cap off a 9-0 run to push the lead to 20-10.

That was the largest lead Oshkosh was able to build in the first half as the Blue Devils responded with an 11-0 run of their own to tie it at 21.

With Mahoney staying hot from the field, it was time for the senior duo of Fravert and Jack Flynn to get things going as they closed out the half scoring 12 of the team's final 18 points to give the Titans a 39-33 lead at the half.

"We didn't really need to make many adjustments once they cut it close," he said. "Instead, we just needed to reaffirm who we are as a team and what makes us

successful. We threw the ball inside and began working the ball from the inside out and ultimately that began to open things up for us a bit."

Looking for a spark, it was the bench once again that helped the Titans offense get going. This time freshman Steckbauer went off with a career high 14 points, scoring 11 straight at one point to give the Titans a 53-45 lead, which was essential to the second-half surge.

"Quinn had a great night tonight for us," Lewis said. "He has invested a ton into his own game and in this team. He is a great

teammate that isn't afraid to work hard. I think over the course of the past few weeks and especially tonight you are seeing his hard work start to pay off."

The entire offense also began to flow as Mahoney, Muench and Eric Peterson hit threes over the course of the next few possessions before a pair of fast-break Fravert dunks, including an off-the-backboard pass from Steckbauer had the building on its feet with the Titans pulling away 69-52.

Oshkosh closes out its regular season home slate today against Whitewater before its season finale Saturday at River Falls.

Titan women stop Stout for third straight

The UW-Oshkosh women's basketball team used a strong defensive effort Saturday en route to a 54-36 Wisconsin Intercollegiate Athletic Conference win over UW-Stout on Saturday on the road.

The Titans (14-9, 7-5 WIAC) used two big quarters to help secure the win, despite being outscored in two of them.

UWO jumped out to a 16-8 lead after the first quarter but then was outscored 11-7 in the second as it went into halftime with a 23-19 lead. The Titans put the game out of reach after the third, when they outscored UW-Stout by 15 points.

The Titans shot 62 percent from the field in that third quarter as it held the Blue Devils (14-9, 5-7) – the WIAC's top-scoring team – to just 18.2 percent.

UW-Stout was held to 28.8 percent shooting and 36 points – its lowest scoring output in four years.

The Titans got 16 points from Karsyn Rueth while Leah Porath added 15 points and six rebounds. Nikki Arneson chipped in nine points in the win.

The University of Wisconsin Oshkosh softball team opens the 2020 season Friday when it hosts Marian University for a doubleheader that marks the first intercollegiate competition at its Rec Plex.

The inaugural Rec Plex games are the first of 14 home contests for the Titans, who have produced 16 consecutive winning seasons and advanced to the NCAA Division III Championship two of the past three years. The Titans will also host 12

games at the UW-Oshkosh Softball Park, beginning with a doubleheader against Loras College (Iowa) April 9.

The Titans, who compiled a 23-17 record last season, begin conference play with a pair of games at defending league champion UW-Whitewater on April 1.

Seventh-year head coach Scott Beyer brings back six members of last year's starting lineup among the 11 previous letter winners returning.

The Lourdes wrestling team may be small, but it's mighty.

In the WIAA Division 3 Regional meet in Markesan on Saturday, all four Knight wrestlers advanced to the sectional meet next week as Keagan Stelzer, Tim Kaull, Kadan Kapp and Jack Reinardy combined for two first-place finishes with two runner ups.

Stelzer (195) and Kaull (220) both went 3-0 on the day and captured first-place finishes. The top two at each weight class advance to sectionals.

Stelzer pinned his opponent in just under three minutes in the championship match while Kaull pinned his opponent in 3:22.

At 113, Kapp pinned his opponent in 2:32 in the second-place wrestleback to advance while Reinardy lost his championship match on a close 5-4 decision. Kapp and Reinardy both finished 3-1.

West, North advance 13 wrestlers to sectionals

The Oshkosh North and Oshkosh West wrestling teams competed in the WIAA Division 1 Regional Meet at Slinger on Saturday, and the two teams combined to advance 13 wrestlers to the sectional meet next week.

The top four at each weight class advance to sectionals.

The Wildcats had seven advance in Alec Hunter (113), Elijah Geffers (120), Logan Grota (138), Collin Jones (170), Roman Martell (182), Ben Buehring (195) and Riley Stobb (220).

Hunter and Martell each captured gold medals, going 3-0. Hunter cruised through the first two matches with pins before winning a close 10-8 decision in the championship match. Martell had a pin in the first match, won by major decision 15-1 in the semis before winning 8-3 in the championship match.

Grota was second after going 3-1. He won his first two matches before falling in the championship match after being pinned. However, he would respond with a pin himself in 3:15 in the second-place wrestleback.

Geffers was third while Jones, Buehring and Stobb were fourth.

Geffers won his first match with a pin in 2:36 before falling in the semis. He then won his third place match with a pin in 4:19. Jones had to work his way back after falling in his first match by winning his next three matches – all pins – to sneak in.

Buehring lost his third place match after getting pinned in less than a minute while Stobb battled back to win his final three matches after falling in the first one.

The Spartans had six wrestlers advance in Jonathon Burk (120), Landon Spanbauer (152), Dylan Besaw (126), Cade Schmitz (132), Jeremiah Chmielewski (170) and Matthew Mathusek (195).

Chmielewski had the best finish for the Spartans as he finished second. He won his first match before falling in the semis on a close 7-4 decision. Then, he battled back to finish second, winning his next two matches – pinning both opponents in just over three minutes.

Mathusek went 2-2 on the day to finish third. He won his first match with a pin in three minutes, but then lost the semis to advance to the third place match, where he pinned his opponent in 52 seconds before losing the second-place match.

Besaw and Schmitz also finished third. Besaw won his first match on a 3-0 decision before being pinned in the semis. He bounced back with a tight 1-0 decision to capture third place. Schmitz pinned his

Herd sits pretty atop G League at All-Star break

The G League does not have an All-Star Game anymore, but the teams still get an extended break during NBA All-Star Weekend. For the Wisconsin Herd, who lead the G League standings at 27-8 through the first 35 games of the season, this is a time to rest and prepare to end the year strong. If the Herd can stay atop the league and hold that top seed the playoffs will run through Oshkosh.

Wisconsin rattled off two more wins in two tries this past week, first exacting some revenge on the College Park Skyhawks on the road Tuesday before coming home and handling the Greensboro Swarm on Thursday night.

The Herd held a commanding double-digit lead heading into the fourth quarter against the Skyhawks just to allow College Park back into the game late. Still, a balanced attack that saw seven Herd players score in double figures got Wisconsin the 118-115 win. As has been a trend lately, Jaylen Adams led the way in scoring with 17 points.

Between the two games, news broke that Adams would represent his country as part of the 2020 USA AmeriCup Qualifying Team, a squad made up of G Leaguers who will compete this week against Puerto Rico, keeping Adams out of the Herd's next two games.

Adams was also named to the Midseason All-NBA G League team, along with Frank Mason and Rayjon Tucker, as the Herd's dominant season continues to be reflected in awards and accolades.

Mason was the one to lead the way in scoring against Greensboro, putting up 31 points, a rebound, five assists and two

steals in the 126-115 victory. The Swarm hung around for most of the game, but in the fourth quarter Wisconsin pulled away. Herd head coach Chase Buford said the difference in the final frame was simple.

"Honestly I think some guys made some shots late," Buford said. "I don't know if we played our best defensive performance — throughout the course of the game, I think we gave them a little life too many different times."

On the way to the victory, Herd history was made. Jemerrio Jones, who leads the

G League in both total rebounds and rebounds per game, set Wisconsin franchise records for total rebounds, offensive rebounds and defensive rebounds. Put simply, no Herd player has ever grabbed as

many rebounds as Jones, and it took him just 34 games to rewrite the record books.

When asked about his rebounding prowess, Jones said he's motivated to go grab boards over opponents who are often taller because he knows it helps the Herd win games.

"It's something I'm willing to do," Jones said. "See we got Jaylen, we got shooters, Cam (Reynolds), DJ (Hogg), and them. I made one (three) today though. We got scorers, I could score too, but I just wait until they come to me. I really do the little things people don't see or realize."

Buford said it would be tough to imagine how his team would look without Jones, and credited him with greasing the wheels on offense in addition to grabbing so many rebounds after the Greensboro win.

"Where would we be without JJ is a hard question to answer," Buford said. "He rebounds, he pushes our pace on the break. He just does everything for us. And you know, he was a monster digging out rebounds tonight against a big team."

That win brought Wisconsin to the All-Star break, with no games until Wednesday when the Herd is on the road against the Grand Rapids Drive. Buford said the break was nothing but a positive for Wisconsin.

"Our guys could use a break," Buford said. "They've been working hard. They could use a break from my voice for a few days, so it'll be good for them."

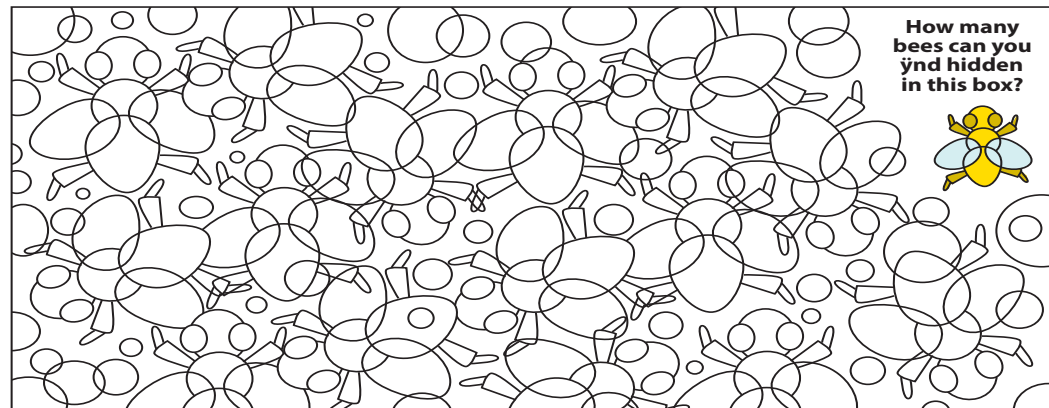

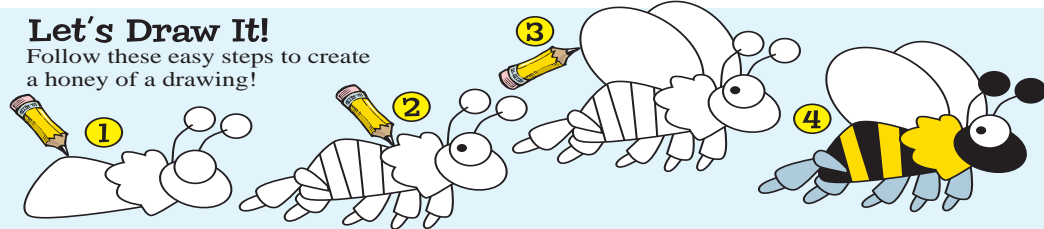

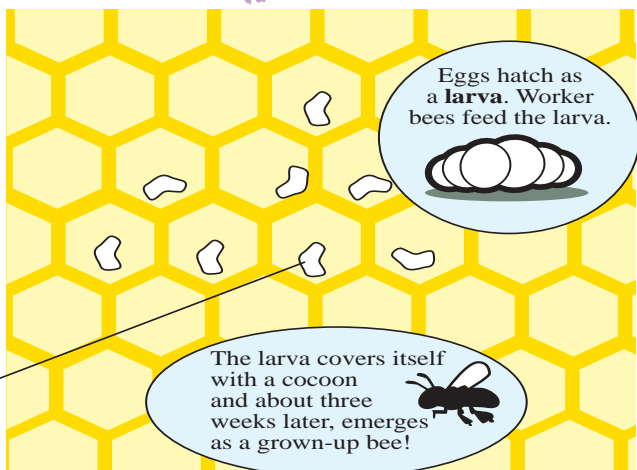

Inside the Hive

A honeybee hive is made of **honeycombs**. A honeycomb is a large sheet made up of six-sided wax boxes called **cells**. There are thousands of these cells in one hive. The little cells are used as both nurseries for young bees and storage for honey and pollen.



The queen bee lays eggs in the cells near the middle of the honeycomb.

Who cares if bees disappear?

While scientists are working hard to learn how to stop colony collapse disorder, beekeepers are starting more hives to help bees survive.

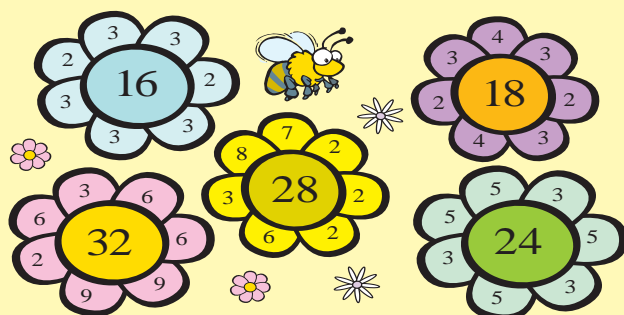
